### IT'S BACK-TO-SCHOOL SEASON (KINDA)

The new school year has begun, and while Mexico has made significant strides in fighting the coronavirus, normalcy is still elusive. Whether students attend classes in person, remotely via video conferencing or a combination of both is dependent upon a single truth: Are classrooms sufficiently large and well-ventilated to ensure students' safety?

Whereas most lecture-based courses continue to be conducted online, science labs and a few other classes are being held on campus and in-person, albeit with flexible scheduling and minimized student densities.

All of our students have recently become eligible to receive a Covid vaccine. While not mandated by their universities, school administrators believe a return to the classroom is dependent upon all students, faculty and staff being vaccinated. A re-evaluation of classroom protocols will likely occur after Christmas, to see if any restrictions can be loosened.



Even with all these challenges, our students are thriving academically, and we enthusiastically applaud their grit and determination.

In other news, after an exhaustive application- and interview-process spearheaded by Anna Adams, *Brillantes* has awarded seven new scholarships to very deserving students. Initial meetings between students and the selection committee were administered virtually whereas final interviews were conducted in each student's home, allowing decision makers to speak with students and family members (masked) face-to-face. Needless to say, we are extremely proud of each and every one of our new students.

Equally deserving are our five recent graduates who head out into the world with confidence and learned wisdom. We wish them all the very best and know they will make positive, transformational changes not only in their communities but to the lives of their families as well. ¡Salúd!

## ODETT IBARA MARTÍNEZ ASSISTS CRIME VICTIMS

Jessica Odett Ibarra Martínez, fourth year law student at the University of Guanajuato, thrives on being busy. During the last school year and the summer of 2021, she did her professional service through Poder Judicial (judicial branch) working with a judge at the prison in Puentecillas. Her focus was on an evolving program called “Siempre a Tu Lado” (Always at Your Side). Its focus is helping crime victims. Odett worked with other institutions in Guanajuato to provide needed services for victims and their families, such as finding employment and family therapy. Odett also worked on new alternatives to prison for minor offenses. Her service was nearly full time while she maintained an excellent grade point average.

Odett’s social service helped her realize that she wanted to work in criminal law. To that end, she did her professional service full time with the same judge during summer 2021. She told the judge that she was unable to work as many hours as he wanted because she needed to work.

The judge was so impressed with her social service that he arranged for her to be paid. She will continue to have paid work this fall as she continues her studies online. Odett is so serious about her commitment that she arranged to move from her family’s home to live with her aunt who lives so much closer to the prison. While studying and doing her service work, Odett has made time to meet with volunteer Rosemarie Conde twice a week to improve her

English. She has had great success. While studying for final exams, she also somehow found time to train for and serve as a poll worker for the June 6 elections.

Odett finds it rewarding to work with both victims and criminal defendants. She likes the human contact and the steady and fast pace of the criminal process. She believes that her work will have an impact beyond one person. No doubt it will.

In January I requested my university certificate and I am currently awaiting its delivery to continue with the degree process.

There are more generations of students to come who will have the same needs we did.
