A Winter/Spring Recap

After two years of living with the challenges and isolation of online and hybrid classes, our students' grades continue to indicate that they are thriving academically. As was true a year ago, many conferences and extracurricular activities have not been available to students.

Although some professional internships have been delayed, graduating students continue to move forward toward completing their final requirements.

Our mentors continue to be invaluable when it comes to maintaining communication and connection between the organization and the students. Of note: BC added nine new mentors over the past year.

The scholarship application for the coming school year was posted on our website in January, with the first application received three hours after it was made available! Thirteen scholars were selected for inperson interviews in April, and of those, eleven will be eligible for home visits by the Scholarship Committee in June.



On the administrative front: The BC annual meeting was held on January 29. What had been planned as an in-person outdoor meeting, was rescheduled at the last minute to Zoom. Attendance was high and included one member who signed in from Washington, as well those of us anchored in Guanajuato.

The president, vice-president, and treasurer—AJ Buckingham, David Spencer, and Jorge Castelazo, respectively—resigned after serving one year each of their second two-year terms. Elections for their offices were held: Ingrid Barradas Bribiesca was

elected president; Christina Rockrise was elected vice-president; and Jeff Tashman was elected treasurer. The two-year term of the secretary, Anna Adams, concluded and Nina Johnson was elected to replace her. The two-year term of the coordinator of student affairs, Ingrid Barradas Bribiesca, also concluded, and Silvia Salas Carreon was elected to the office. In the intervening months however, Silvia has had to resign due to health issues, and the Board of Directors is currently looking for a qualified replacement.

The annual financial report showed a healthy bottom line: budgeted revenues were exceeded and expenses were lower than budgeted. Overall, 96 percent of our 2021 expenses supported the students: 82 percent went to scholarships and 14 percent to other student-related items like computers, healthcare, and student meeting expenses.

Life Stories of This Year's Scholarship Applicants in Their Own Words

"Time and experience have taught me that I need to work hard to get what I want. After trying unsuccessfully to get into medical school for a year, I decided to try something new. I took the entrance exam for nursing and obstetrics, and I passed it on my first attempt. That made me realize that one must fight for one's dreams, and not just hold onto a single option. In life, there are many different roads from which to choose."

"Previously, I made up excuses for situations I couldn't manage. I now realize that these obstacles in my life are put there by me alone, and I vow to not to submit to those obstacles, but to overcome them."

"My mother abandoned my brother and me when I was four years old. With the passage of time, I've learned to live without her and to appreciate the great people that I had in my life – my grandmother and my father. My father is for me the most important person in my life because he knows how to handle difficult situations. As a schoolchild I was very insecure and didn't work hard, but I've come to be one of my class's most outstanding students."

"Besides studying, I work in a restaurant. I work so that I can have the things I'd like to have, because my mother can only pay for my studies. It's not easy for her to support my sister and me all by herself. Our life is a little hard, but we always try to get ahead."

"Since I was young, I have worked to help my parents with the expenses. But now that my sister has a good job and can support my parents, I've decided to continue my studies."

"[One] of my challenges is not having a laptop to do my schoolwork and homework. It's very difficult to do all that on a telephone. Also, I feel bad because my single mother has done everything to support me. Sometimes I wouldn't tell her about materials I needed for school so that she wouldn't spend so much on me."

"The greatest obstacle that I have had in my studies is [living in my rural neighborhood]. In my community there are very few services. We have no telephone signal, very little transportation and very few jobs. Public transportation only offers three buses per day."

The Gift of Reading for Three Kings Day



All of our current students were invited to celebrate Three Kings Day on January 8 in the Casa Museo Gene Byron Garden. It was the first time all of them had met together as a group since March 2020; recent graduates were also invited, so that they could have the opportunity to bid farewell in person.

All the necessary precautions were taken and all of the necessary treats procured.

Dianne Romain, a longtime BC mentor and sponsor, donated copies of *The Trumpet Lesson*, her novel that was published in 2019 and is set in the *callejones* of Guanajuato. Students were invited to help themselves to a copy, along with selecting another gift—a Spanish-language novel from the pile of gaily-wrapped books that were bought with money from the Colleen Cote Memorial Book Fund.







BC Participates in Local Social Service Fair



The Division of Social Action AC, a local nonprofit organization, invited Brillantes Caminantes to participate in a social service fair that was held in the Jardin de la Union in November 2021. We were one of about a dozen nonprofits that publicized their missions and needs over the course of the afternoon. It was a great opportunity for BC to promote itself to Guanajuato's citizens.
