#### **OUR NEW BOARD MEMBERS**


#### KATHERINE KRAUSE - SECRETARY

Our students are amazing people. We want you to get to know them better! Recently, Ingrid Barradas Bribiesca, our BC-AC President, had the opportunity to visit Martin at his job.

Martin, a second-year student is obtaining his Control and Administration of Quality degree at the University of Guanajuato. In addition to his studies, he works Saturdays, Sundays, and Mondays at Maxcota- a pet store owned by Max!

Martin has worked at Maxcota for over a year. His responsibilities include caring for all the animals and assisting customers. He gave Ingrid a tour of the pet store. Maxcota is a typical pet store- rabbit cages, pet food, supplements, and medications. Ingrid also got to see the "cave." The "cave" is an area in the rear of the store where fresh and saltwater fish, a snake, and a tarantula live in semi-darkness. Martin also showed Ingrid a container of little mice sold as food for other animals. Martín has no

problem with this because "snakes and hawks need to eat too! "

Martin has learned about the different animals by researching on the internet and from his coworkers. Martin enjoys using his knowledge to advise customers when selecting a pet that is right for them.

While "working and studying are two completely different things," Martin finds what he has learned in his studies has practical applications in his work. For example, quality control is essential when he is preparing food for the animals. The food needs to be consistent and of good quality. # You can donate directly to BC from if you have a traditional IRA and save on your U.S. taxes

If you are 70 ½ years or older, you can make a direct donation from your IRA to Brillantes Caminantes, A.C. (a qualified US nonprofit charity) and <u>not pay income taxes on the amount donated</u>. This amount also counts toward the federal government's requirement to withdraw from your IRA once you reach age 72. Consult your financial advisor or IRA administrator for details.
